A Family-School Compact for Achievement is an agreement that parents, students, and teachers develop together. It explains how parents and teachers will work together to make sure all our students reach or exceed grade-level standards.

Effective compacts:

- link to school goals and focus on student learning skills.
- describe how teachers will help students develop those skills using high-quality instruction.
- share strategies parents can use at home.
- explain how teachers and parents will communicate about student progress.
- describe opportunities for parents to volunteer and participate in the classroom.

The parents, students and staff of Snowshoe Elementary School developed this School-Parent Compact for providing positive behavioral supports, extended learning and increased parent engagement. Meetings are held each year in September to review the Compact and make changes based on student needs.

## Communicating Student Learning

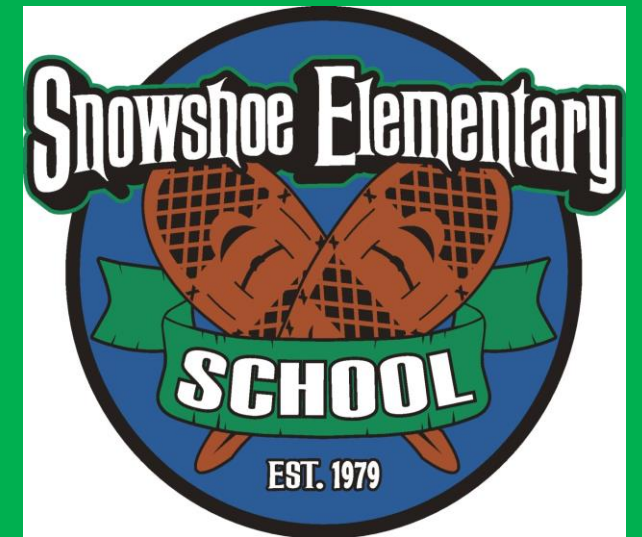
Snowshoe Elementary School is committed to frequent two-way communication with families their child's learning. Some of the ways you can expect us to reach you are:

### Classroom

### Students

- Participate and listen during lessons
- Actively participate in daily reading
- Do their best on unit programs and district assessments
- Complete and return Math and Reading homework
- Follow the Trailblazers Guidelines for Success and Second Step

### Home

Snowshoe parents worked with staff to develop ideas about how families can support students' success in academic and social areas.

To be successful, parents will:

- Be responsible for regular school attendance
- Listen to and/or read daily with your child
- Encourage students to always do his/her best
- Assist and check your child's homework
- Discuss daily learning with your child

### School Goals for Student Improvement:

Students scoring at or above the 40% on the MAP in Reading will increase by 5%

Students scoring at or above the 40% on the MAP in Math will increase by 5%

Student conflict will decrease by 5%

Parent Engagement will increase by 10%
